- 1) Pursuant to the General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) and circular issued by SEBI vide circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFDPoD-2/ P/ CIR/ 2024/ 133 dated October 3, 2024 (“SEBI Circular”) and other applicable circulars and notifications issued (including any statutory modifications or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force and as amended from time to time, companies are allowed to hold AGM through Video Conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM), without the physical presence of members at a common venue. In compliance with the said Circulars, AGM shall be conducted through VC / OAVM.
- 2) Pursuant to General Circular No. 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023, in relation to “Clarification on passing of ordinary and special resolutions by companies under the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, Government of India (collectively, referred to as the “MCA Circular”), the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed to this Notice. However, the Body Corporates are entitled to appoint authorised representatives to attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and participate there at and cast their votes through e-voting. Institutional/Corporate Shareholders (i.e. other than individuals/HUF, NRI, etc) are required to send a scanned copy (PDF/JPEG Format) of its Board Resolution or governing body Resolution/Authorisation etc. authorising its representative to attend the Annual General Meeting through VC/OAVM on its behalf and to vote through remote e-voting.
- 3) The explanatory statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') with respect to the special businesses set out in the notice is annexed hereto and forms part of this notice.
- 4) The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee,

Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.

- 5) Since the AGM will be held through VC/ OAVM, the route map of the venue of the Meeting is not annexed hereto.
- 6) The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- 7) Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings (SS-2) issued by the ICSI and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs from time to time the Company is providing facility of remote e-Voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-Voting system as well as e-voting on the date of the AGM will be provided by NSDL.
- 8) In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.orchidsecuritiesltd.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. MSE Limited at www.msei.in and the AGM Notice is also available on the website of NSDL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) i.e. www.evoting.nsdl.com
- 9) AGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 2/2021 dated January 13, 2021.
- 10) Members are informed that in case of joint holders attending the Meeting, only such joint holder whose name stands first in the Register of Members of the Company/ list of Beneficial Owners as received from National Securities Depository Limited (“NSDL”) /Central Depository Services (India) Limited (“CDSL”) (collectively referred to as “Depositories”) in respect of such joint holding will be entitled to vote.
- 11) Generally, a member entitled to attend and vote at the meeting is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on a poll instead of himself and the proxy need not be a member of the company. Since this AGM is being held through VC / OAVM pursuant to the MCA circulars, physical attendance of members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for

appointment of proxies by the members will not be available for the AGM and hence the proxy form and attendance slip are not annexed hereto.

- 12) **Mr. Kamal A Lalani**, a Practicing Company Secretary (FCS 13814) and (COP No. 25395), has been appointed as “Scrutinizer” to scrutinize the e-voting process and voting at the AGM in a fair and transparent manner and he has communicated his willingness to be appointed.
- 13) The voting rights of members shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date of **22nd September, 2026**. Members shall have one vote for every one fully paid share of the Company held by them as on the cut-off date. Members can vote for their entire voting rights as per their discretion.
- 14) Pursuant to the MCA Circulars, the Notice of the AGM is being sent only by electronic mode to those Members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company /Depositories and whose names appears in the Register of Members as on **28th August, 2026**. Copy of the Notice of the AGM is also available for download on the website of the Company at www.orchidsecuritiesltd.com, the e-voting portal i.e. www.evoting.nsdl.com and on the websites of the Stock Exchanges, i.e. MSEI at www.msei.in
- 15) Members who have not registered their email addresses with the Company/ RTA or their Depositories for receiving all communication (including Notice and Annual Report) from the Company electronically can get the same registered as follows:

- 16) Members will be able to attend AGM through VC/ OAVM by logging on to the e-voting website of NSDL at www.evoting.nsdl.com by using their e-voting login credentials. On this webpage, click on the tab Shareholders / Members, the Video Conferencing/ webcast link would be available.
- 17) Members who would like to express their views/ ask questions during the AGM may register themselves as a speaker by sending their request in advance at least seven days before the AGM. Members who do not wish to speak during the AGM but have queries may send their queries, mentioning the name, securities demat account number/folio number, email id, mobile number to compliance@iccslimited.in can send their queries in advance 7 days prior to meeting.

- 18) Only those Members who have registered themselves as a speaker will be allowed to express their views/ ask questions during the AGM for a maximum time of 2 (Two) minutes each, once the floor is open for shareholder queries. The Company reserves the right to restrict the number of speakers and number of questions depending on the availability of time for the AGM.
- 19) SEBI has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are required to submit their PAN to their Depository Participants and Members holding shares in physical form shall submit their PAN to Purva Sharegistry (India) Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai (Company's Registrar & Share Transfer Agents) or to the Company Secretary at the registered office of the Company.
- 20) Members seeking any information or clarification with regard to the accounts are requested to write to the Company at least Seven days in advance of meeting so that the required information can be readily available in the Meeting.
- 21) Members who are present in the meeting through VC / OAVM and have not cast their vote on resolutions through remote e-voting, shall be allowed to vote through e-voting system during the Meeting.
- 22) The Members who have cast their vote by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may also attend/participate in the AGM through VC / OAVM but shall not be entitled to cast their vote again.
- 23) As per Regulation 40 of The SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015; as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred/ transmitted/ transposed only in dematerialized form with effect from 01st April, 2019. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, Members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form.
- 24) Members holding shares in physical form and wishing to avail of the nomination facility, are requested to send the duly filled in nomination form (Form SH-13) to the Company's Registrar & Share Transfer Agent.
- 25) Members are requested to notify any changes to their respective Depository Participants.
- 26) In pursuance of Sections 112 and 113 of the Act, representatives of the Corporate Members may be appointed for the purpose of voting through remote e-voting or for participation and voting in the AGM held through VC or OAVM. Institutional/Corporate Members (i.e. other than individuals/HUF, NRI, etc.) are required to send a scanned copy (PDF/JPG Format) of its board or governing body resolution/authorization, etc., authorizing their representative to attend the AGM on its behalf and to vote in the AGM. DIVIDEND:

Despite the Company having earned a profit during the current year, the Board of Directors has not recommended any dividend for the year under review, considering the accumulated losses carried forward from previous years. The substantial improvement in profitability reflects the Company's continued efforts towards strengthening its financial position and improving operational performance. The Board of Directors and management remain committed to enhancing the overall performance and financial strength of the Company. Going forward, the Company remains cautiously optimistic about the growth opportunities in the financial services and NBFC sector and expects to further strengthen its business performance in the coming years.

MATERIAL CHANGES AND COMMITMENTS AFFECTING THE FINANCIAL POSITION OF THE COMPANY OCCURRED DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR:

During the year under review, a material change affecting the financial position and risk profile of the Company occurred with respect to its largest loan exposure to a single party. The Company obtained a mortgage over an immovable property as security against such loan exposure. The value of the mortgaged property is substantially higher than the outstanding loan amount, thereby significantly strengthening the security cover and mitigating the Company's credit risk in respect of the said exposure.

SIGNIFICANT / MATERIAL ORDERS PASSED BY THE REGULATORS OF COURTS OR TRIBUNALS IMPACTING THE COMPANY'S OPERATION IN FUTURE:

During the year under review no such material order has been passed by the Regulators or Court or Tribunals having adverse effect on the operation of the Company in future.

CIRCULATION OF ANNUAL REPORTS IN ELECTRONIC FORM:

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) has continue to exempt companies from circulation of physical copies of Annual Report for FY 2025-26. The internal control framework is designed to ensure the orderly and efficient conduct of business, safeguarding of assets, accuracy and reliability of financial reporting, compliance with applicable laws and regulations, and prevention and timely detection of frauds and errors.

The Company has implemented a Risk-Based Internal Audit (RBIA) Framework under which business processes are audited based on their risk profile. The framework covers key operational and financial controls, including loan operations, cash management, KYC and Anti-Money Laundering (AML) compliance, information technology controls, and regulatory compliance. STATUTORY AUDITORS:

M/s. VCA & Associates, Chartered Accountants, (Firm Registration No. 114414W), Vadodara re-appointed as the Statutory Auditors of the Company at its Board Meeting held on August 29, 2025, for a second term of five years from the conclusion of 32nd AGM until the conclusion of 37th AGM of the Company. The firm performs its obligations in adherence to recognized auditing standards and periodically certifies its independence from the management. The statutory auditors' report which is attached to the financial statements and forms part of this report.

AUDITORS REPORT:

They have audited the financial statements of the Company for the year under review. The observations of Statutory Auditors in their Report read with relevant Notes to Accounts are self-explanatory except mentioned below and therefore, do not require further explanation under Section 134 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Notes on financial statement referred to in the Auditors' Report are self-explanatory and do not require any additional comments. The Statutory Auditors' Report to the members for the financial year under review includes a qualified opinion. The management's response to the Basis for Qualified

Opinion, as outlined in the Statutory Auditors' Report (referred to hereafter as "the Basis for Qualified Opinion"), is as follows:

Details of Audit Qualification:

As at March 31, 2026, the Net Owned Fund of the Company is below the minimum prescribed threshold of Rs.500 Lakhs under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934. Non-restoration of the Net Owned Fund to the prescribed level within the regulatory timeline may result in cancellation of the Company's Certificate of Registration, casting significant doubt on its ability to continue as a going concern (refer Note No.4 of financial statements).

We draw attention to Note 5 & 6 of the financial statements, which states that the Company has granted a loan to a single party that exceeds its net owned funds which is contrary to the RBI Master Directions for Non-Banking Financial Companies As of the reporting date, no recovery has been made in respect of the said loan. However, the Company has made an appropriate provision in the books in accordance with the applicable regulatory framework.

Further in our view, this transaction is not in compliance with the exposure norms prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) for NBFCs classified as NBFC-ND-NSI, which restrict lending to a single party beyond a specified threshold, and also the implication of non-compliance towards minimum threshold of net owned fund limit. Such non-compliance may also result in significant regulatory consequences, including but not limited to imposition of penalties, restrictions on business operations, or cancellation/suspension of the Certificate of Registration (CoR) issued by the Reserve Bank of India under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934. Accordingly, this matter is considered material to the financial statements and to the Company's continued regulatory standing.

Response to Qualification:

The Management has carefully considered the observations made by the Auditors with respect to the Net Owned Fund ("NOF") requirements and exposure norms prescribed under the applicable regulatory framework of the Reserve Bank of India ("RBI"). The Management recognizes the importance of maintaining adequate capital and complying with the prescribed regulatory parameters and is taking appropriate steps to strengthen the financial position of the Company. The Company is evaluating various measures, including capital augmentation, optimization of its financial resources and other appropriate financial and operational measures, to progressively align its NOF and exposure position with the applicable regulatory requirements.

The Management remains focused on maintaining financial stability and ensuring that the Company's resources are appropriately managed in accordance with the nature and scale of its lending operations. The Company continues to monitor its capital position, lending portfolio and regulatory parameters on an ongoing basis. The Management is confident that the measures being undertaken, together with the Company's ongoing recovery and business efforts, will support improvement in its financial and regulatory position.

With regard to the loan exposure referred to in Note Nos. 5 and 6 to the financial statements, the Management would like to place on record that the said exposure is secured by way of a mortgage over immovable property. The security available with the Company provides substantial collateral coverage against the outstanding loan exposure. Based on the valuation and information available with the Company, the estimated realizable value of the mortgaged property is substantially higher than the outstanding loan amount. Accordingly, the Management considers the collateral available to be a significant mitigating factor in respect of the credit risk associated with the said exposure.

The Company has also undertaken an assessment of the recoverability of the outstanding loan exposure by considering the available security, the financial position and repayment capacity of the borrower, the recovery prospects and other relevant factors. Based on such assessment, the Company has duly recognized Expected Credit Loss (“ECL”) and made appropriate impairment provisions in its books in accordance with the applicable accounting framework and regulatory requirements. The impairment provision recognized by the Company reflects the Management’s assessment of the credit risk associated with the exposure based on information available as at the reporting date.

The Management continues to closely monitor the said account and is actively pursuing recovery of the outstanding dues. Regular communication and engagement are being maintained with the borrower with a view to achieving recovery and settlement of the outstanding amount. The Company is also evaluating and pursuing appropriate recovery measures, as may be considered necessary, to protect its financial interests and maximize recovery.

It is pertinent to note that the Company has taken proactive steps to strengthen the security position of the said exposure by obtaining the mortgage of the underlying immovable property. The substantial value of the security in comparison with the outstanding loan exposure provides an additional level of protection to the Company and mitigates the potential impact of the identified credit risk.

The Management is committed to addressing the regulatory observations and strengthening the Company’s overall financial position. The Company will continue to monitor its NOF, exposure levels, asset quality, recoveries and provisioning requirements on a regular basis and will take appropriate corrective measures wherever considered necessary.

Considering the substantial collateral security available, the ECL and impairment provision recognized, the ongoing recovery efforts and the steps being undertaken by the Company to strengthen its capital and regulatory position, the Management is of the view that the matters referred to by the Auditors do not materially impair the recoverability of the outstanding loan exposure or the Company’s ability to continue its operations. The Management remains confident of improving the Company’s financial and regulatory position and is committed to ensuring sustainable and compliant growth of the Company’s business.

INTERNAL AUDITORS:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 138 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Rule 13 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 M/s. VRCA & Associates, Chartered Accountants (Firm Registration No. 104727W), has been appointed as Internal Auditors

The Internal Auditors reports directly to the Audit Committee of the Board. The Audit Committee quarterly reviews the audit findings as well as the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control measures. Further, the Board in its Meeting held on May 27, 2026, has approved the re-appointment of M/s VRCA & Associates, Chartered Accountants (FRN: 104727W) as Internal Auditors of the Company to carry out the Internal Audit for the Financial Year 2026-27.

There are no materially significant related party transactions made by the Company with Promoters, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, or other designated persons which may have a potential conflict with the interest of the Company at large. RBI GUIDELINES

The Company is in compliance with the NBFC – Corporate Governance (Reserve Bank) Directions, 2015. It has complied with and continues to comply with all applicable laws, rules, circulars, and regulations, including the Master Direction – Reserve Bank of India (Non-Banking Financial Company – Scale Based Regulation) Directions, 2023, and the guidelines issued thereunder. The Company continues to adhere to the prudential norms prescribed by the RBI in respect of non-performing assets, capital adequacy, statutory liquidity assets, and other applicable requirements.

However, the Company has not complied with the RBI's exposure norms applicable to NBFCs classified as NBFC-ND-NSI. Specifically, the Company has extended a loan to a single party in excess of its net owned funds, which is not permissible under the aforesaid guidelines. As of the reporting date, no recovery has been effected in respect of this loan.

That said, the Company has taken appropriate actions by making a provision in its books in accordance with the applicable regulatory framework and is committed to addressing this matter proactively.

The Company has acknowledged the deviation from its lending policy in extending the loan and has since strengthened its governance and control mechanisms to prevent recurrence. To safeguard its position, a registered mortgage deed over the borrower's assets has been executed, thereby ensuring adequate collateral coverage. In line with Ind AS 109 and RBI guidelines, the Company has assessed the Expected Credit Loss (ECL) and recorded an appropriate impairment provision in its books.

PREVENTION OF INSIDER TRADING CODE

As per SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulation, 2015, the Company has adopted a Code of Conduct for Prevention of Insider Trading with a view to regulate trading in securities by the Directors and designated persons of the Company which was reviewed by the Board from time to time and amended accordingly till date. The Code requires pre-clearance for dealing in the Company's shares and prohibits the purchase or sale of Company's shares by the Directors and the designated persons while in possession of Unpublished Price Sensitive Information (UPSI) in relation to the Company and during the period when the Trading Window is closed.

The Company has also installed structural digital database. The Company has SDD Software License from Purva Sharegistry India Pvt. Ltd. to monitor/ facilitate compliance with the SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015, as amended.

During the year under review, there has been due compliance with the said code.

GLOBAL ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT:

The global economy demonstrated resilience during the financial year under review, although the economic outlook continues to be influenced by geopolitical tensions, evolving trade policies, financial conditions and volatility in energy and commodity prices. The International Monetary Fund ("IMF"), in its January 2026 World Economic Outlook Update, projected global economic growth at 3.3% for 2026, supported by continued investment in technology, including artificial intelligence, fiscal and monetary support, relatively accommodative financial conditions and the adaptability of the private sector. Global headline inflation was projected to moderate from an estimated 4.1% in 2025 to 3.8% in 2026.

However, subsequent developments, particularly the evolving geopolitical situation in the Middle East and the resulting energy-market disruptions, have increased uncertainty around the global economic outlook. The OECD's June 2026 Economic Outlook projects global GDP growth at approximately 2.8% in 2026, moderating from 3.4% in 2025, with growth expected to improve to 3.1% in 2027. The OECD has also projected G20 consumer price inflation at around 4.0% in 2026, reflecting higher energy and commodity prices, before moderating to 3.1% in 2027, subject to the easing of energy-related pressures.

The global economic environment therefore remains characterised by a combination of resilience and heightened uncertainty. Geopolitical developments, disruptions in energy and commodity markets, changes in trade policies, supply-chain realignment and movements in interest rates continue to influence investment and business decisions globally. A prolonged period of elevated energy prices or further geopolitical escalation could adversely affect inflation, consumer demand and economic growth.

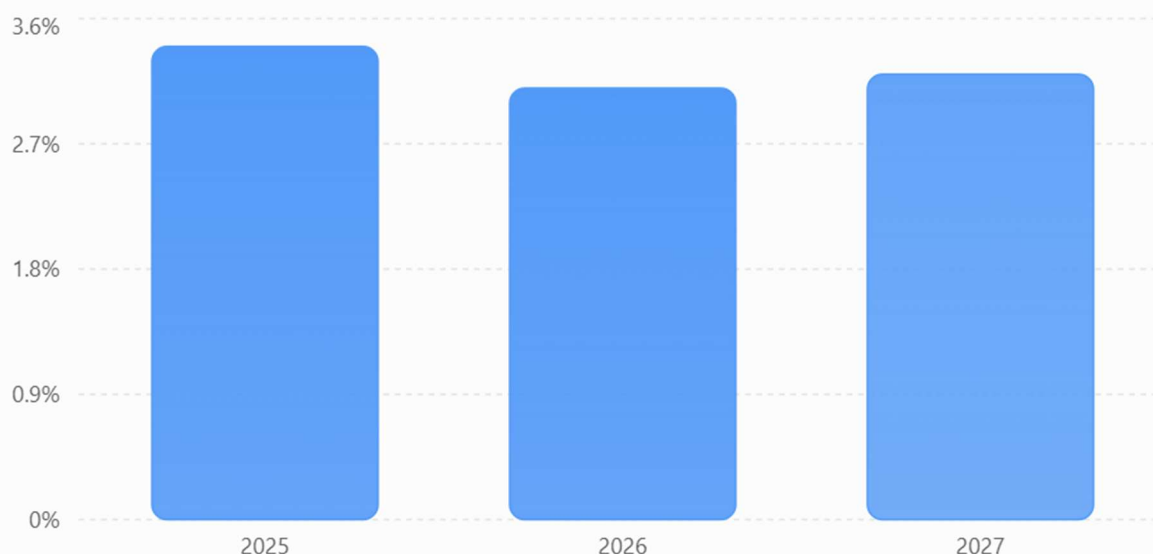
At the same time, continued technological investment, diversification of global supply chains and improving adaptability of businesses provide opportunities for sustainable economic activity. Emerging markets and developing economies are expected to remain important contributors to global growth, supported by domestic demand, investment and structural reforms.

For the financial services sector, the global environment presents both opportunities and challenges. While moderation in inflation and potential easing of financial conditions may support credit demand and economic activity, volatility in interest rates, asset quality risks, liquidity conditions and macroeconomic uncertainties remain important factors requiring prudent risk management. Against this backdrop, financial institutions, including NBFCs, are expected to maintain adequate capital and liquidity, strengthen credit underwriting and monitoring systems, and adopt a disciplined approach towards asset quality and recoveries.

The Company remains cognizant of the evolving global economic environment and its potential impact on the financial services sector. The Company continues to focus on prudent credit management, effective monitoring of its loan portfolio, timely recovery of outstanding dues and efficient utilisation of its financial resources. The Management remains cautiously optimistic about the medium- to long-term prospects of the financial services sector and will continue to monitor economic and regulatory developments closely while pursuing sustainable growth opportunities.

INDIAN ECONOMIC REVIEW AND OUTLOOK:

The Indian economy demonstrated strong resilience and maintained a robust growth trajectory during FY 2025–26, despite an uncertain and evolving global economic environment. India continued to remain among the fastest-growing major economies globally, supported by strong domestic demand, resilient private consumption, sustained investment activity, government capital expenditure and continued growth in the services sector.

As per the latest Provisional Estimates released by the National Statistical Office (“NSO”), Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (“MoSPI”), India’s real GDP grew by 7.7% in FY 2025–26, compared with 7.1% in FY 2024–25. Real GDP at constant prices is estimated at ₹323.12 lakh crore in FY 2025–26, compared with ₹299.89 lakh crore in FY 2024–25. Nominal GDP is estimated at ₹346.36 lakh crore, registering growth of 8.9% during the year.

The growth momentum remained broad-based. Real GVA recorded an estimated growth of 7.9% in FY 2025–26, compared with 7.3% in the previous year. The services sector continued to be an important contributor to economic activity, while manufacturing, construction and investment activity also supported overall growth. The resilience of domestic consumption and continued public investment provided an important foundation for economic expansion.

Domestic Demand and Investment:

Domestic demand remained a key driver of economic activity during the year. Private consumption continued to provide support to overall growth, while government expenditure on infrastructure and productive capital assets supported investment and economic activity across various sectors.

Continued investments in roads, railways, logistics, urban infrastructure and other critical infrastructure have contributed to improving connectivity and productive capacity. Alongside public investment, increasing formalisation of economic activity, digitalisation and greater adoption of technology are supporting productivity and creating new opportunities across the economy.

The continued expansion of the services sector, including financial services, information technology, professional services, trade, transportation and communication, further contributed to India’s economic resilience.

Inflation and Monetary Environment:

Inflationary conditions remained relatively favourable during a significant part of FY 2025–26, supported by improved food supply conditions, agricultural output and various supply-side measures. The moderation in inflation provided greater flexibility to monetary policy while maintaining the objective of preserving price stability.

The Reserve Bank of India (“RBI”) continued to closely monitor inflation, liquidity and economic growth. The easing of monetary and liquidity conditions during the year provided a supportive environment for credit demand and economic activity. At the same time, the financial sector remained focused on maintaining adequate liquidity, prudent credit underwriting and effective asset-liability management.

External Sector and Global Uncertainties:

Despite strong domestic fundamentals, the Indian economy remained exposed to developments in the global economy. Geopolitical tensions, changes in global trade policies, volatility in crude oil and other commodity prices and movements in international capital flows continued to create uncertainties during the year.

These developments also had implications for currency movements, inflation and financing conditions. However, India's strong domestic demand, diversified economic structure, improving infrastructure and resilient financial system provided important buffers against external shocks.

The economy therefore remained relatively well positioned to absorb external uncertainties while maintaining its underlying growth momentum.

Financial Services and NBFC Sector:

The strong domestic economic environment provided a supportive backdrop for the financial services sector. Continued economic growth, increasing formalisation, digitalisation, financial inclusion and infrastructure development are expected to support credit demand across various segments of the economy.

For the NBFC sector, FY 2025–26 reinforced the importance of disciplined credit growth, prudent underwriting standards, effective asset-quality monitoring, adequate liquidity, diversified funding sources and sound asset-liability management.

The sector also continued to operate within an evolving regulatory framework, with increasing emphasis on governance, risk management, capital adequacy, customer protection, responsible lending and transparency. Accordingly, maintaining a strong risk-management framework and appropriate provisioning continues to remain critical for sustainable growth.

Outlook:

India's underlying economic fundamentals remain resilient. Real GDP growth of 7.7% in FY 2025–26, following growth of 7.1% in FY 2024–25, demonstrates the continued strength of the domestic economy.

The medium- to long-term outlook remains supported by domestic consumption, infrastructure investment, financial inclusion, digitalisation, increasing formalisation and continued structural reforms. These factors are expected to create sustained opportunities for the financial services and NBFC sector.

At the same time, the Company remains mindful of potential risks arising from global economic conditions, interest-rate movements, liquidity conditions, asset quality, borrower creditworthiness, regulatory developments and geopolitical uncertainties.

Against this backdrop, the Company remains cautiously optimistic about the prospects of the Indian financial services sector. The Company will continue to focus on prudent lending, disciplined credit growth, effective monitoring and recovery of its loan portfolio, appropriate provisioning, efficient utilisation of financial resources and compliance with applicable RBI and other regulatory requirements.

The Management believes that the continued resilience of the Indian economy, together with increasing financial inclusion and digitalisation, provides a favourable foundation for sustainable growth in the NBFC sector. The Company will continue to adopt a measured, risk-conscious and customer-focused approach while pursuing opportunities for strengthening its business and financial position.

Monetary Policy and Regulatory Environment

During FY 2025–26, the Reserve Bank of India (“RBI”) maintained a calibrated monetary policy framework focused on balancing price stability, economic growth and financial-system stability. Monetary policy decisions during the year were guided by evolving inflation trends, domestic growth conditions, liquidity requirements and global macroeconomic developments.

The RBI progressively eased monetary conditions during the year in response to moderation in inflationary pressures and the need to support economic activity. The policy repo rate stood at 5.25% as at December 2025, compared with 6.50% at the beginning of the easing cycle. The RBI also reduced the Cash Reserve Ratio (“CRR”) to 3.00%, thereby releasing additional liquidity into the banking system.

The easing of monetary conditions was supported by a significant moderation in inflation. The Economic Survey 2025–26 reported that headline CPI inflation had moderated substantially during the year, supported by favourable food-supply conditions, improved agricultural output and supply-side measures. The decline in inflation provided greater flexibility to monetary policy to support economic activity while continuing to maintain focus on price stability.

The reduction in the policy rate and CRR contributed to an improvement in system liquidity and supported the transmission of monetary policy to lending rates. The relatively softer interest-rate environment was favourable for credit demand and provided financial institutions with an opportunity to manage their funding costs more efficiently.

IMPACT ON THE NBFC SECTOR

For NBFCs, changes in monetary and liquidity conditions have a direct bearing on borrowing costs, availability of funds, lending rates, credit demand and margins. The easing of monetary conditions during the year provided a relatively supportive environment for the sector. However, NBFCs continued to remain exposed to risks arising from changes in funding costs, liquidity conditions, asset quality and borrower repayment capacity.

The RBI continued to place significant emphasis on strengthening the resilience of the NBFC sector through appropriate regulatory and supervisory measures. Key areas of regulatory focus included capital adequacy, governance, risk management, asset quality, concentration risk, liquidity management, customer protection and responsible lending practices.

The Company continues to closely monitor developments in monetary policy and the regulatory environment and assesses their potential impact on its lending operations, funding requirements and overall financial position. The Company remains focused on maintaining prudent credit standards, effective monitoring of its loan portfolio, timely recovery of outstanding dues, appropriate provisioning and disciplined asset-liability management.

Outlook:

The moderation in inflation and easing of monetary conditions during FY 2025–26 provided a relatively supportive backdrop for the financial services sector. At the same time, global geopolitical developments, commodity-price volatility, currency movements and changes in global interest rates remain important external risks.

The Management believes that India's strong domestic economic fundamentals, continued formalisation, financial inclusion and increasing demand for credit provide a favourable medium- to long-term operating environment for NBFCs. The Company will continue to follow a measured and risk-conscious approach to lending and capital deployment, while maintaining adequate focus on liquidity, asset quality, recoveries and regulatory compliance.

NON-BANKING FINANCIAL COMPANIES (NBFCs)

The Non-Banking Financial Company (“NBFC”) sector continued to play an important role in India’s financial ecosystem during FY 2025–26, supporting credit delivery across retail, MSME and other underserved segments of the economy. The sector benefited from sustained domestic economic activity, increasing financial inclusion, digitalisation and continued demand for formal credit.

During the year, NBFCs continued to adopt a more calibrated approach towards credit growth, with greater emphasis on prudent underwriting, asset quality, liquidity management and risk-adjusted growth. The sector also continued to strengthen its balance sheets and risk-management frameworks in response to the evolving regulatory environment.

Key developments in the NBFC sector during the year included:

- **Digitalisation:** NBFCs continued to expand the use of digital platforms across customer onboarding, credit assessment, documentation, servicing and collections. Increased adoption of technology contributed to improved operational efficiency, faster turnaround times and greater accessibility of financial services.
- **Asset Quality:** Asset quality remained broadly stable, supported by improved underwriting standards, enhanced portfolio monitoring and strengthening of recovery mechanisms.

Regulatory focus on credit discipline and risk management further supported the resilience of the sector.

- **Growth Drivers:** Retail lending, vehicle finance, consumer finance and MSME lending continued to remain important growth segments. NBFCs benefited from their established presence in Tier-II and Tier-III cities, semi-urban areas and other underserved markets, where demand for formal credit continues to expand.
- **Funding and Liquidity:** NBFCs continued to maintain diversified funding profiles through bank borrowings, financial institutions, debt markets, securitization and other funding channels. Effective liquidity and asset-liability management remained critical to maintaining financial resilience and supporting sustainable credit growth.
- **Technology and Innovation:** The sector continued to leverage data analytics, digital credit assessment, fintech partnerships and technology-enabled lending models to improve credit evaluation, customer service and portfolio monitoring. These developments are expected to further support financial inclusion, particularly across rural and semi-urban markets.

At the same time, the sector operated under enhanced regulatory and supervisory oversight, with continued emphasis on corporate governance, capital adequacy, liquidity management, asset quality, responsible lending, digital lending practices and customer protection. The evolving regulatory framework is expected to strengthen the resilience and sustainability of the NBFC sector over the medium to long term.

Overall, the NBFC sector remains well positioned to benefit from India's continuing economic growth, increasing formalisation, digitalisation and financial inclusion. Going forward, sustainable growth is expected to remain closely linked to prudent credit practices, strong risk management, diversified funding sources and effective regulatory compliance.

BUSINESS PERFORMANCE AND SEGMENT REPORTING

This section presents an analysis of the financial results for the year ended March 31, 2026. The Company's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS') as prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, as amended from time to time. The key accounting policies followed in the preparation of these financial statements are detailed in the notes to the Standalone Financial Statements.

SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE:

During FY26, the company achieved operating revenue of ₹.1030.54 lakhs, which is 1293% Higher than earlier year's ₹.73.98 Lakhs.

EBIDTA for FY26 was ₹. 986.85 lakhs versus ₹ (1431.75) lakhs for FY25, increase of 168.93 %.

Net Profit for FY26 was ₹. 842.35 Lakhs versus ₹. (1564.80) Lakhs for FY25, increase of 153.83%

Earnings per share increase from ₹. (14.23) for FY25 to ₹. 7.66 for FY26

Note: The profit for the year primarily arose due to the reversal of the impairment provision previously recognized against a borrower account, following the receipt of adequate security in the form of a mortgage over the borrower's assets. Accordingly, the provision made in the earlier period was reassessed and reversed before finalization of the audit report, resulting in a positive impact on the Company's profitability for the year. The Company expects to maintain improved financial performance in the coming year.

The increase in income during the year was primarily attributable to the reversal of impairment provisions and an increase in income from business facilitation services, reflecting improved recoverability of financial assets and higher business facilitation activity during the year.

Finance cost increased by 8.87% from ₹132.26 lakh in FY 2024–25 to ₹143.99 lakh in FY 2025–26, primarily due to changes in the Company's borrowing levels and funding requirements during the year. The Company continues to focus on prudent management of its funding costs and efficient utilization of financial resources.

The decrease in impairment expense during the year is primarily attributable to the reversal of impairment provision amounting to ₹980.70 lakh, following the receipt of security against the underlying exposure and reassessment of its recoverable value. The Company had an impairment provision of ₹1,470.42 lakh in the previous year, out of which ₹980.70 lakh has been reversed during FY 2025–26, while the balance provision continues to be retained in the books based on the Company's assessment of the remaining exposure and recoverability.

Employee benefits expense decreased by 8.55%, from ₹13.56 lakh in FY 2024–25 to ₹12.40 lakh in FY 2025–26. The decrease was primarily due to better optimisation of employee-related costs and changes in the employee strength and remuneration structure during the year. Consequently, employee benefits expense as a percentage of revenue also declined significantly, reflecting improved cost efficiency during the year.

Depreciation and amortization expense decreased by 34.15%, from ₹0.82 lakh in FY 2024–25 to ₹0.54 lakh in FY 2025–26. The decrease was primarily due to lower depreciable asset base and depreciation charge on existing assets during the year. Consequently, depreciation and amortization expense as a percentage of revenue also declined from 1.11% to 0.04%, reflecting the relatively low capital-intensive nature of the Company's operations.

Other expenses increased by 139.93%, from ₹21.89 lakh in FY 2024–25 to ₹52.52 lakh in FY 2025–26. The increase was primarily attributable to reversal/adjustment of interest and penal interest charges during the year, along with other routine operating expenses. Despite the increase in absolute terms, other expenses as a percentage of revenue declined significantly from 29.59% to 4.13%, mainly due to the substantial increase in the Company's revenue during the year.

BALANCE SHEET ITEMS:

- **Total Assets:** Increased significantly by 127.43%, from ₹714.44 lakh to ₹1,624.91 lakh, primarily due to the reversal of impairment provisions, resulting in an increase in the carrying value of financial assets, along with growth in the loan portfolio.
- **Loans:** Increased by 129.00%, from ₹561.99 lakh to ₹1,286.35 lakh, primarily due to the reversal of impairment provisions during the year, which increased the carrying value of the loan portfolio, along with growth in lending activities.

- **Cash & Cash Equivalents:** Increased from ₹10.07 lakh to ₹61.11 lakh, indicating a significant improvement in the Company's liquidity position.
- **Borrowings:** Increased marginally by 3.63%, from ₹1,178.10 lakh to ₹1,220.89 lakh, despite the substantial increase in loans.
- **Other Equity:** Improved significantly from negative ₹1,592.30 lakh to negative ₹749.95 lakh, primarily due to the profit earned during FY 2025–26 and reduction in accumulated losses.
- **Overall:** The Company's balance sheet strengthened considerably during the year, supported by strong growth in the loan portfolio, improved liquidity and a substantial reduction in accumulated losses.

The Company is evaluating and pursuing diversified growth opportunities across lending, financial services and strategic investments, while maintaining a prudent and risk-conscious approach. The key areas under consideration include:

- **Vehicle Finance:** Financing of two-wheeler and three-wheeler electric vehicles, including EVs manufactured by Group entities, in line with the growing adoption of electric mobility.
- **Working Capital Finance:** Providing short- and medium-term financing facilities to eligible businesses to meet their working capital requirements.
- **General Corporate Financing:** Extending financing facilities for legitimate and viable general corporate requirements, subject to applicable regulatory and risk parameters.
- **Sector-focused Investments:** Selective investment and financing opportunities in sectors demonstrating long-term growth potential, including healthcare, food and consumer products, aviation, electric mobility and financial services, subject to due diligence and regulatory requirements.

- **Short-term Lending:** Deployment of surplus funds through short-term loans and advances to eligible borrowers, based on appropriate credit assessment and risk-return considerations.
- **Marketable Securities and Mutual Funds:** Prudent deployment of surplus liquidity in marketable securities, mutual funds and other permitted financial instruments, with emphasis on liquidity, safety and risk-adjusted returns.

Accordingly, the Company has implemented a comprehensive internal control framework aimed at continually evaluating the adequacy, effectiveness, and efficiency of its financial and operational controls. Regular audits of all functions are conducted by the internal auditors to ensure compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and internal policies and procedures.

The management remains committed to maintaining a robust internal control environment that is aligned with the size and complexity of the business. This framework provides assurance regarding compliance with internal policies, applicable laws and regulations, and safeguards the Company's assets and resources. Company policies are regularly reviewed and updated to reflect changes in the business environment and evolving regulatory requirements. The Board periodically reviews compliance with internal control systems as well as findings from internal audit reports.

Based on the internal financial control framework and compliance systems established and maintained by the Company, along with the work carried out by the Internal, Statutory, Secretarial, and Information Systems Auditors, external consultants, and the reviews conducted by the management and the Audit Committee, it is affirmed that the Company has robust internal financial

controls. These controls are adequate, effective, and appropriate for the nature and scale of its operations, with no material weaknesses identified.

OPPORTUNITIES & THREATS:

Opportunities

The Non-Banking Financial Company (“NBFC”) sector continues to play an important role in India's financial ecosystem by providing flexible, accessible and timely credit to retail customers, MSMEs and other underserved segments. The Company's business model provides opportunities to participate selectively across various lending and investment segments, while maintaining a prudent approach towards credit quality, liquidity and regulatory compliance.

The Company is focused on diversifying its lending and investment portfolio and exploring opportunities in vehicle finance, particularly electric two-wheelers and three-wheelers, working capital finance, general corporate financing, short-term lending, financial investments and selective sector-focused investments. The Company also evaluates opportunities arising from the growth of its Group's businesses, including electric mobility, healthcare, food and consumer products, financial services and other emerging sectors, subject to appropriate due diligence and applicable regulatory requirements.

Key opportunities for the Company include:

- **Financial Inclusion:** Growing demand for formal credit in rural, semi-urban and underserved markets provides opportunities to expand the Company's lending portfolio.
- **MSME and Business Finance:** Continued formalization and expansion of India's MSME ecosystem is expected to support demand for working capital and other financing solutions.
- **Electric Mobility Financing:** Rapid adoption of electric two-wheelers and three-wheelers presents an emerging opportunity for vehicle financing, particularly in the light commercial and last-mile mobility segments.
- **Digital Transformation:** Increasing adoption of digital platforms, data analytics and technology-enabled credit assessment can improve customer reach, operational efficiency, portfolio monitoring and collection capabilities.

The Company intends to pursue these opportunities selectively, with emphasis on risk-adjusted returns, asset quality, liquidity, regulatory compliance and sustainable growth.

Threats

The Company operates in a competitive and highly regulated financial-services environment. While the medium-term outlook for the NBFC sector remains positive, several factors may affect the Company's growth, profitability and asset quality.

Key risks and challenges include:

- **Regulatory and Compliance Risk:** The RBI continues to strengthen the regulatory and supervisory framework applicable to NBFCs. Changes in capital requirements, governance standards, provisioning, lending practices, digital lending, customer protection or other regulatory requirements may increase compliance costs and affect business operations.
- **Interest Rate and Funding Cost Risk:** Changes in interest rates and liquidity conditions may affect the Company's cost of funds, lending rates, interest margins and overall profitability.
- **Credit and Asset Quality Risk:** Deterioration in borrower repayment capacity, particularly in stressed economic or sectoral conditions, may result in increased defaults, NPAs and provisioning requirements.
- **Competition:** The Company faces increasing competition from banks, established NBFCs, fintech companies, digital lenders and other financial institutions. Competitive pressure may affect pricing, customer acquisition and margins.
- **Liquidity and Asset-Liability Management:** Any disruption in availability of funding or adverse changes in liquidity conditions may affect the Company's ability to finance its lending activities and meet its financial obligations.
- **Macroeconomic and Geopolitical Risks:** Economic slowdown, inflationary pressures, commodity-price volatility, geopolitical tensions and global financial-market developments may adversely affect credit demand and borrower repayment capacity.
- **Concentration Risk:** Excessive exposure to a particular borrower, sector, geography or asset class may increase the Company's vulnerability to sector-specific or borrower-specific adverse developments. The Company therefore continues to focus on appropriate exposure limits and portfolio diversification.
- **Technology and Cybersecurity Risk:** Increasing dependence on digital systems and technology-enabled financial services exposes financial institutions to cybersecurity, data privacy, fraud and operational risks, requiring continuous strengthening of IT controls and cybersecurity measures.
- **Recovery and Collection Risk:** Timely recovery of outstanding dues remains critical to maintaining asset quality and liquidity. Any delay or deterioration in recoveries may increase credit costs and impact profitability.

OVERALL OUTLOOK

Despite the above challenges, the Management believes that India's strong domestic economic fundamentals, increasing financial inclusion, digitalisation, formalisation of the economy and growing demand for credit provide meaningful long-term opportunities for the NBFC sector. The Company intends to adopt a calibrated and risk-conscious growth strategy, with continued emphasis on asset quality, prudent underwriting, diversified funding, effective recovery mechanisms and compliance with the applicable regulatory framework.

EVOLVING REGULATORY LANDSCAPE:

In recent years, the financial services sector has come under increased scrutiny and tighter regulatory oversight. This is especially evident in the case of Non-Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs), which have grown substantially in scale, complexity, and their interconnected role within the financial system. To bridge the regulatory gap between banks and NBFCs, there is a clear shift toward aligning NBFC regulations more closely with those governing the banking sector.

I. Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

1. Qualified Opinion

- A. We have audited the accompanying Financial Statements of **I SECURE CREDIT & CAPITAL SERVICE LIMITED** ("the Company"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on that date, and a summary of the material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the Financial Statements").
- B. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid Financial Statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view except, for the matters provided in basis for qualified opinion, in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2026, its loss and changes in equity and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

2. Basis for Qualified Opinion

We conducted our audit of the Ind AS Financial Statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing specified under section 143(10) of the Act (SAs). Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) together with the independence requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ICAI's Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the Financial Statements.

As at March 31, 2026, the Net Owned Fund of the Company is below the minimum prescribed threshold of Rs.500 Lakhs under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934. Non-restoration of the Net Owned Fund to the prescribed level within the regulatory timeline may result in cancellation of the Company's Certificate of Registration, casting significant doubt on its ability to continue as a going concern

The Company has granted a loan to a single party that exceeds its net owned funds which is contrary to the RBI Master Directions for Non-Banking Financial Companies. As of the reporting date, no recovery has been made in respect of the said loan. However, the Company has made an appropriate provision in the books in accordance with the applicable regulatory framework.

Further in our view, this transaction is not in compliance with the exposure norms prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) for NBFCs classified as NBFC-ND-NSI, which restrict lending to a single party beyond a specified threshold, and also the implication of non-compliance towards minimum threshold of net owned fund limit. Such non-compliance may also result in significant regulatory consequences, including but not limited to imposition of penalties, restrictions on business operations, or cancellation/suspension of the Certificate of Registration (CoR) issued by the Reserve Bank of India under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934. Accordingly, this matter is considered material to the financial statements and to the Company's continued regulatory standing.

3. Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern

As stated in the basis of qualification the likely impact of regulatory action indicate that a material uncertainty exist that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, in and as an NBFC.

Our opinion is not modified in this regard.

4. Key Audit matter

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and are the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section hence we do not provide a separate section on these matters.

5. Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

- A. The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's Report, Business Responsibility Report, Corporate Governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the Financial Statements and our auditor's report thereon.
- B. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so,

consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the Financial Statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

- C. When we read such other information as and when made available to us and if we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information; we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

6. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

- A. The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these Financial Statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance, total comprehensive income, changes in equity and cash flows of the Company in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) specified under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
- B. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the Financial Statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Material Accounting Policies and Notes to Financial Statements

1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

I Secure Credit & Capital Services Limited (the "Company") was incorporated on March 9, 1994 is a public limited company domiciled in India and incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956. Metropolitan Stock Exchange of India Limited. The Company is registered under section 45-IA of The Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 to commence/carry on the business of a

The financial statements of the Company for the year ended March 31, 2026 were approved for issue in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Directors on May 27, 2026.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION AND MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the application of fair value measurements required or allowed by relevant accounting standards. Accounting policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented, unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, as the management is satisfied that the Company shall be able to continue its business for the foreseeable future and no material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the going concern assumption. In making this assessment, the management has considered a wide range of information relating to present and future conditions, including future projections of profitability, cash flows and capital resources.

2.2 Presentation of financial statements

The Balance Sheet, Statement of Profit and Loss and Statement of Changes in Equity are prepared and presented in the format prescribed in the Division III of Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013 (the 'Act'). The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared and presented as per the requirements of Ind AS 7.

The Company presents its balance sheet in order of liquidity. An analysis regarding recovery or settlement of assets and liabilities of the Company as on balance sheet dates, within 12 months after the reporting date and more than 12 months after the reporting date.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are generally reported gross in the balance sheet. They are only offset and reported net when, in addition to having an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts without being contingent on a future event, the parties also intend to settle on a net basis in all of the following circumstances:

- The normal course of business.
- The event of default.
- The event of insolvency or bankruptcy of the company/ or its counterparties.

Amounts in the financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees in lakh, which also the company's functional currency, and all amounts have been rounded off to the nearest lakhs unless otherwise indicated.

2.3 Material Accounting Policies

A) Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Company's balance sheet on trade date, i.e. when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs and revenues that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs and revenues of financial assets or financial liabilities carried at fair value through the profit or loss account are recognised immediately in the Statement of Profit or Loss. Trade Receivables are measured at transaction price.

1) Financial assets

Classification

On initial recognition, depending on the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and its contractual cash flow characteristics, a financial asset is classified as measured at;

- 1) Amortised cost;
- 2) Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI); or
- 3) Fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL).

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows. Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition, except if and in the period the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

A financial asset is measured at amortized cost using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method if it meets both of the following conditions and is not recognised as at FVTPL:-

- The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

On initial recognition of an equity investment that is not held for trading, the Company may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in the investment's fair value in OCI (designated as FVTOCI - equity investment). This election is made on investment - by - investment basis.

All financials assets not classified and measured at amortized cost or FVTOCI as described above are measured at FVTPL. On initial recognition, the Company may irrevocably designate the financials assets that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortized cost or at FVTOCI or at FVTPL, if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces the accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

Business model assessment

The Company makes an assessment of the objective of the business model in which a financial asset is held at a portfolio level because this best reflects the way the business is managed, and information is provided to management. The information considered includes:

- The stated policies and objectives for the portfolio and the operation of those policies in practice.
- How the performance of the portfolio is evaluated and reported to the Company's management;
- The risks that affect the performance of the business model (and the financial assets held within that business model) and how those risks are managed;
- The frequency, volume, and timing of sales of financial assets in prior periods, the reasons for such sales and expectations about future sales activity.
- How managers of the business are compensated (e.g. whether the compensation is based on the fair value of the assets managed or on the contractual cash flows collected).

At the initial of a financial asset, the Company determines whether newly recognized financial assets are part of an existing business model or whether they reflect a new business model. The Company reassesses its business models each reporting period to determine whether the business models have changed since the preceding period.

Assessment whether contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and Interest.

Financial assets at FVTPL	These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Net gains and losses, including any interest or dividend income, are recognised in the statement of profit or loss. The transaction costs and fees are also recorded related to these instruments in the statement of profit and loss.
Financial assets at amortised cost	These assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The amortised cost is reduced by impairment losses. Interest income, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in the statement of profit or loss. Any gain or loss on de-recognition is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.
Financial assets (other than Equity Investments) at FVTOCI	Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both, selling financial assets and collecting contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest, are subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income (OCI). Interest income measured using the EIR method and impairment losses, if any are recognised in the statement of Profit and Loss. On derecognition, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to other income' in the statement of Profit and Loss.
Equity investments at FVTOCI	These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Dividends are recognised as income in the Statement of Profit and Loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Other net gains and losses are recognised in OCI and are not reclassified to profit or loss.

For the purposes of this assessment, 'principal' is defined as the fair value of the financial asset on initial recognition. That principal amount may change over the life of the financial assets (e.g. if there are payments of principal). Amount of 'Interest' is defined as consideration for the time value of money and for the credit risk associated with the principal amount outstanding during a particular period and for other basic lending risks and costs (e.g. liquidity risk and administrative costs), as well as a profit margin.

In assessing whether the contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest, the Company considers the contractual terms of the instrument. This includes assessing whether the financial asset contains a contractual term that could change the timing or amount of contractual cash flows such that it would not meet this condition. In making this assessment, the Company considers:

- Contingent events that would change the amount or timing of cash flows;
- Terms that may adjust the contractual coupon rate, including variable interest rate features;
- Prepayment and extension features; and
- Terms that limit the Company's claim to cash flows from specified assets.

Contractual cash flows that are SPPI are consistent with a basic lending arrangement. Contractual terms that introduce exposure to risks or volatility in the contractual cash flows that are unrelated to a basic lending arrangement, such as exposure to changes in equity prices or commodity prices, do not give rise to contractual cash flows that are SPPI.

A prepayment feature is consistent with the solely payments of principal and interest criterion if the prepayment amount substantially represents unpaid amounts of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding, which may include reasonable additional compensation for early termination of the contract. Additionally, for a financial asset acquired at a significant discount or premium to its contractual par-amount, a feature that permits or requires prepayment at an amount that substantially represents the contractual par amount plus accrued (but unpaid) contractual interest (which may also include reasonable additional compensation for early termination) is treated as consistent with this criterion if the fair value of the prepayment feature is insignificant at initial recognition.

Subsequent measurement and gains and losses

Reclassifications within classes of financial assets

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition, except in the period after the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

The classification and measurement requirements of the new category apply prospectively from the first day of the first reporting period following the change in business model that results in reclassifying the Company's financial assets.

Impairment of Financial Assets:

Impairment approach

Overview of the Expected Credit Losses (ECL) principles:

The Company records allowance for expected credit losses for all loans and other financial assets not held at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) in this section all referred to as 'financial instruments'. Equity instruments are not subject to impairment under Ind AS 109.

The ECL allowance is based on the credit losses expected to arise over the life of the asset (the lifetime expected credit loss), unless there has been no significant increase in credit risk since origination, in which case, the allowance is based on the 12 months' expected credit loss.

Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. The 12-month ECL is the portion of Lifetime ECL that represent the ECLs that result from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within the 12 months after the reporting date.

Both Lifetime ECLs and 12-month ECLs are calculated on either an individual basis or a collective basis, depending on the nature of the underlying portfolio of financial instruments. The Company has grouped its loan portfolio into personal loans and business loan.

The Company has established a policy to perform an assessment, at the end of each annual reporting period, of whether a financial instrument's credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, by considering the change in the risk of default occurring over the remaining life of the financial instrument. The Company does the assessment of significant increase in credit risk at a borrower level. If a borrower has various facilities having different past due status, then the highest days past due (DPD) is considered to be applicable for all the facilities of that borrower.

Based on the above process, the Company categorises its loans into Stage 1, Stage 2 and Stage 3, as described below:

Stage 1: All exposures where there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition or that has low credit risk at the reporting date and that are not credit impaired upon origination are classified under this stage. The Company classifies all advances up to 30 days overdue under this category. Stage 1 loans also include facilities where the credit risk has improved and the loan has been reclassified from Stage 2.

Stage 2: All exposures where there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition but are not credit impaired are classified under this stage. Exposures are classified as Stage 2 when the amount is due for more than 30 days but do not exceed 90 days.

Stage 3: All exposures are assessed as credit impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset have occurred. Exposures where the amount remains due for 90 days or more are considered as to be stage 3 assets.

As required by RBI Circular reference no. RBI/2019-20/170 DOR (NBFC).CC.PD.No. 109/22.10.106/ 2019-20 dated March 13, 2020; where impairment allowance under Ind AS 109 is lower than the provisioning required as per extant prudential norms on Income Recognition, Asset Classification and Provisioning (IRACP) including borrower/beneficiary wise classification, provisioning for standard as well as restructured assets, NPA ageing, etc., the Company shall appropriate the difference from their net profit or loss after tax to a separate 'Impairment Reserve'.

Upgradation of accounts classified as Stage 3/Non-performing assets (NPA) - The Company upgrades loan accounts classified as Stage 3/ NPA to 'standard' asset category only if the entire arrears of interest, principal and other amount are paid by the borrower and there is no change in the accounting policy followed by the company in this regard. With regard to upgradation of accounts classified as NPA due to restructuring, the instructions as specified for such cases as per the said RBI guidelines shall continue to be applicable.

Credit-impaired financial assets

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether financial assets carried at amortised cost. A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred.

Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable data:

- a) Significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer;
- b) A breach of contract such as a default or past due event;
- c) The restructuring of a loan or advance by the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise;
- d) It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- e) The disappearance of an active market for a security because of financial difficulties

Undrawn loan commitments

Undrawn loan commitments are commitments under which, over the duration of the commitment, the Company is required to provide a loan with pre-specified terms to the customer. Undrawn loan commitments are in the scope of the ECL requirements.

Financial guarantee contract:

A financial guarantee contract requires the Company to make specified payments to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because a specified debtor fails to make payments when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument.

Financial guarantee contracts issued by the Company are initially measured at their fair values and, if not designated as at FVTPL and not arising from a transfer of a financial asset, are subsequently measured at the higher of:

- The amount of the loss allowance determined in accordance with Ind AS 109; and

- The amount initially recognised less, where appropriate, cumulative amount of income recognised in accordance with the Company's revenue recognition policies.

The company has not designated any financial guarantee contracts as FVTPL.

Company's ECL for financial guarantee is estimated based on the present value of the expected payments to reimburse the holder for a credit loss that it incurs. The shortfalls are discounted by the interest rate relevant to the exposure.

The Measurement of ECLs

The mechanics of the ECL calculations are outlined below and the key elements are as follows:

Exposure-At-Default (EAD): The Exposure at Default is the amount the Company is entitled to receive as on reporting date including repayments due for principal and interest, whether scheduled by contract or otherwise, expected drawdowns on committed facilities.

Probability of Default (PD): The Probability of Default is an estimate of the likelihood of default of the exposure over a given time horizon. A default may only happen at a certain time over the assessed period, if the facility has not been previously derecognised and is still in the portfolio.

Loss Given Default (LGD): The Loss Given Default is an estimate of the loss arising in the case where a default occurs at a given time. It is based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due and those that the lender would expect to receive, including from the realisation of any collateral.

The ECL allowance is applied on the financial instruments depending upon the classification of the financial instruments as per the credit risk involved. ECL allowance is computed on the below mentioned basis:

12-month ECL: 12-month ECL is the portion of Lifetime ECL that represents the ECL that results from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within the 12 months after the reporting date. 12-month ECL is applied on stage 1 assets.

Lifetime ECL: Lifetime ECL for credit losses expected to arise over the life of the asset in cases of credit impaired loans and in case of financial instruments where there has been significant increase in credit risk since origination. Lifetime ECL is the expected credit loss resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. Lifetime ECL is applied on stage 2 and stage 3 assets.

The Company computes the ECL allowance either on individual basis or on collective basis, depending on the nature of the underlying portfolio of financial instruments. The Company has grouped its loan portfolio into corporate loans, SME loans and Commercial vehicle loans.

Impairment of Trade receivables

Impairment allowance on trade receivables is made on the basis of lifetime credit loss method, in addition to specific provisions considering the uncertainty of recoverability of certain receivables.

Write-off

Impaired loans and receivables are written off, against the related allowance for loan impairment on completion of the Company's internal processes and when the Company concludes that there is no longer any realistic prospect of recovery of part or all the loan. For loans that are individually assessed for impairment, the timing of write off is determined on a case by case basis. A write-off constitutes a de-recognition event. The Company has a right to apply enforcement activities to recover such written off financial assets. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to the statement of profit and loss.

Modification and De-recognition of financial assets

Modification of financial assets

A modification of a financial asset occurs when the contractual terms governing the cash flows of a financial asset are renegotiated or otherwise modified between initial recognition and maturity of the financial asset. A modification affects the amount and/or timing of the contractual cash flows either immediately or at a future date. The Company renegotiates loans to customers in financial difficulty to maximise collection and minimise the risk of default. A to pay under the original contractual terms, there is a high risk of default or default has already happened and the borrower is expected to be able to meet the revised terms. The revised terms in most of the cases include an extension of the maturity of the loan, changes to the timing of the cash flows of the loan (principal and interest repayment), reduction in the amount of cash flows due (principal and interest forgiveness). Such accounts are classified as Stage 3 immediately upon such modification in the terms of the contract. Not all changes in terms of loans are considered as renegotiation and changes in terms of a class of obligors that are not overdue is not considered as a renegotiation and is not subjected to deterioration in staging.

De-recognition of financial assets

A financial asset or a part of financial asset is derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset have expired. The Company also derecognises the financial asset if it has both transferred the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for derecognition.

The Company has transferred the financial asset if, and only if, either:

- The Company has transferred its contractual rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset; or
- It retains the rights to the cash flows but has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows.

A transfer only qualifies for derecognition if either:

- The Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- The Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the Risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

The Company considers control to be transferred if and only if, the transferee has the practical ability to sell the asset in its entirety to an unrelated third party and is able to exercise that ability unilaterally and without imposing additional restrictions on the transfer.

When the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards and has retained control of the asset, the asset continues to be recognised only to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement, in which case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

Off-setting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously backed by past practice.

(2) Financial Liabilities & Equity Instruments

Classification as debt or equity

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity Instruments

An Equity Instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Company after deducting all of its liabilities. Repurchase of the Company's own equity instruments is recognised and deducted directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in the statement of Profit and Loss on the purchase, sale, issue or cancellation of the Company's own equity instruments.

Financial Liabilities

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

Financial liabilities at FVTPL

Financial liabilities at FVTPL include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at FVTPL. Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading, if they are incurred for the purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind AS 109 - "Financial Instruments".

Financial liabilities measured at amortised cost

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method except for those designated in an effective hedging relationship.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium and fee or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance costs in the statement of Profit and Loss. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in profit or loss over the period of the borrowings using the EIR method.

Derecognition of financial Liabilities in the following circumstances:

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expires. Where an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference between the carrying value of the original financial liability and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

B) Fair Value Measurement

On initial recognition, all the financial instruments are measured at fair value. For subsequent measurement, the Company measures certain categories of financial instruments at fair value on each balance sheet date. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- 1) In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- 2) In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

In order to show how fair values have been derived, financial instruments are classified based on a hierarchy of valuation techniques, as summarised below:

Fair values are categorized into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

Level 1: quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data.

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorized in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred, if any.

C) Property plant and equipment's

(1) PPE

Recognition and measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE) are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Estimated cost of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it's located does not arise for owned assets. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Borrowing costs relating to acquisition of assets which takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are also included to the extent they relate to the year till such assets are ready to be put to use. Any trade discounts and rebates are deducted in arriving at the purchase price. Gains or losses arising from derecognition of such assets are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognized.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent costs are included in the assets carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and that the cost of the item can be reliably measured. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

Depreciation commences when the assets are ready for their intended use. It is recognised to write down the cost of assets less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight-line method basis. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

The Company has adopted the useful life as specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

Depreciation on assets purchased / sold during the period is recognised on a pro-rata basis to the Statement of Profit and Loss till the date of sale.

Purchased software/licenses are amortised over the estimated useful life during which the benefits are expected to accrue. The method of amortisation and useful life are reviewed at the end of each accounting year with the effect of any changes in the estimate being accounted for on a prospective basis. Amortisation on impaired assets is provided by adjusting the amortization charge in the remaining periods to allocate the asset's revised carrying amount over its remaining useful life.

(2) Intangible assets

a) Recognition and Measurement

An intangible asset is recognised only when its cost can be measured reliably and it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to it will flow to the Company. Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation. Expenses on software support and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the year in which such costs are incurred. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a business combination is their fair value as at the date of acquisition.

b) Intangible assets under development

Intangible assets not ready for the intended use on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Intangible assets under development".

c) Amortisation

Intangible assets are amortised using the straight-line method over a period of 10 years, which is the management's estimate of its useful life. The amortisation period and the amortisation method are reviewed at least as at each financial year end. If the expected useful life of the asset is significantly different from previous estimates, the amortisation period is changed accordingly. Gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of an intangible asset are determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and recognised as income or expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

d) Capital work-in-progress

PPE not ready for the intended use on the date of the Balance Sheet are disclosed as "capital work-in-progress" and carried at cost, comprising direct cost, related incidental expenses and attributable interest.

e) Investment Property

Properties held to earn rentals and/or capital appreciation are classified as Investment properties and are reported at cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition it's measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. When the use of an existing property changes from owner-occupied to investment property, the property is reclassified as investment property at its carrying amount on the date of reclassification. An investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefits

are expected from the disposal. Any gain or loss arising on the de-recognition of property is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the same period.

f) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible, intangible assets & Investment property to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the statement of Profit and Loss.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the statement of Profit and Loss.

g) De-recognition of property, plant and equipment and intangible asset

An item of property, plant, and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of PPE is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. An intangible asset is derecognised on disposal, or when no future economic benefits are expected from use or disposal. Gains or losses arising from de-recognition of an intangible asset, measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset, are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

h) Right of Use

Under Ind AS 116, the company recognises right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for certain types of leases. The Company presents right-of-use assets and lease liabilities separately on the face of the Balance sheet. The Company recognises a right-of-use asset & a lease liability at the leases commence date. The right-of-use assets is initially measured at cost and subsequently at cost less any accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if

any, and adjusted for certain re-measurement of the lease liability. When a right-of-use asset meets the definition of Investment property, it is presented in investment property. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at fair value, in accordance with the Company's accounting policies.

D) Assets held for sale

Assets are classified as held for sale if their carrying amount is intended to be recovered principally through a sale (rather than through continuing use) when the asset is available for immediate sale in its present condition subject only to terms that are usual and customary for sale of such asset and the sale is highly probable and is expected to qualify for recognition as a completed sale within one year from the date of classification.

Assets classified as held for sale are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell.

Once classified as Held for sale, the assets are no longer amortised or depreciated.

E) Recognition of Income

Revenue generated from the business transactions (other than for those items to which Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments are applicable) is measured at fair value of the consideration to be received or receivable by the Company. Ind AS 115 Revenue from contracts with customers outlines a single comprehensive model of accounting for revenue arising from contracts with customers.

The Company recognises revenue from contracts with customers based on a five-step model as set out in Ind AS 115:

Step 1: Identify contract(s) with a customer

Step 2: Identify performance obligations in the contract

Step 3: Determine the transaction price

Step 4: Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations in the contract

Step 5: Recognise revenue when (or as) the Company satisfies a performance obligation

(a) Recognition of interest income

Interest income is recorded using the effective interest rate (EIR) method for all financial instruments measured at amortised cost. The EIR is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument or, when appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

The EIR for the amortised cost asset is calculated by taking into account any discount Or premium on acquisition, origination fees, processing fees, documentation charges and transaction costs that are an integral part of the EIR, except when it is not an integral part of loan.

If expectations regarding the cash flows on the financial asset are revised for reasons Other than credit risk. The adjustment is booked as a positive or negative adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset in the balance sheet with an increase or reduction in interest income. The

adjustment is subsequently amortised through Interest income in the statement of profit and loss.

The Company calculates interest income by applying the EIR to the gross carrying amount of financial assets other than credit-impaired assets. When a financial asset becomes credit-impaired and is, therefore, regarded as 'Stage 3', the Company recognised the interest income by applying the effective interest rate to the net amortised cost of the financial asset. If the financial status of the financial asset improves and it no longer remains to be a credit-impaired, the Company revises the application of interest income on such financial asset to calculating interest income on a gross basis.

Interest income on all trading assets and financial assets mandatorily required to be measured at FVTPL is recognised as interest income in the statement of profit or loss.

(b) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the dividend will flow to the Company and the amount of the dividend can be measured reliably.

(c) Syndication, advisory & other fees

Syndication, advisory & other fees are recognized as income when the performance obligation as per the contract with customer is fulfilled and when the right to receive the payment against the services has been established.

(d) Origination fees

Origination fees, which the Company has received/recovered at time of granting of a loan, is considered as a component for computation of the effective rate of interest (EIR) for the purpose of computing interest income, except when it is not an integral part of loan.

(e) Net gain/(loss) on Fair value changes

Any differences between the fair values of financial assets classified as fair value through the profit or loss, held by the Company on the balance sheet date is recognised as an unrealised gain or loss as a gain or expense respectively.

Similarly, any realised gain or loss on sale of financial instruments measured at FVTPL and debt instruments measured at FVOCI is recognised in net gain / loss on fair value changes.

(f) Recoveries of Financial assets written off

The company recognizes income on recoveries of financial assets written off on realization or when the right to receive the same without any uncertainties of recovery is established.

(g) Leases

Leases are classified as operating lease where significant portion of risks and reward of ownership of assets acquired under lease is retained by the lessor. Leases of assets under which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are effectively retained by the lessee are classified as finance lease.

Asset given on lease:

Assets given under finance lease are recognised as a receivable at an amount equal to the net investment in the lease. Lease rentals are apportioned between principal and interest on the internal rate of return. The principal amount received reduces the net investment in the lease and interest is recognised as revenue. Under operating leases (excluding amount for services such as insurance and maintenance), lease rentals are recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term, except for increase in line with expected inflationary cost increases.

Asset taken on lease:

The Company's assets taken on lease primarily consist of leases for properties.

As a lessee, the Company previously classified leases as operating or finance leases based on its assessment of whether the lease transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. Under Ind AS 116, the Company recognises right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for certain type of its leases.

The Company presents right-of-use assets and lease liabilities separately on the face of the Balance sheet. Lease payments (including interest) have been classified as financing cash flows.

The Company recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The cost of the right-of-use asset measured at inception shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to be incurred by the lessee in dismantling and removing the underlying asset or restoring the underlying asset or site on which it is located.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if any, and adjusted for certain re-measurements of the lease liability.

The right-of-use assets is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right-of-use asset. The estimated useful lives of right-of-use assets are determined on the same basis as those of property, plant and equipment. Right-of-use assets are tested for impairment whenever there is any indication that their carrying amounts may not be recoverable. Impairment loss, if any, is recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

When a right-of-use asset meets the definition of investment property, it is presented in investment property.

The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses an incremental borrowing rate.

The lease liability is subsequently increased by the interest cost on the lease liability and decreased by lease payment made. The carrying amount of lease liability is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or lease modifications or to reflect revised in-substance fixed lease payments. A change in the estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual

value guarantee, or as appropriate, changes in the assessment of whether a purchase or extension option is reasonably certain to be exercised or a termination option is reasonably certain not to be exercised.

The Company has applied judgement to determine the lease term for some lease contracts in which it is a lessee that include renewal options. The assessment of whether the Company is reasonably certain to exercise such options impacts the lease term, which significantly affects the amount of lease liabilities and right of use assets recognised. The discounted rate is generally based on incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease being evaluated

F) Finance Costs

The Company recognises interest expense on the borrowings as per EIR methodology which is calculated by considering any ancillary costs incurred and any premium payable on its maturity.

Interest expense includes origination costs that are initially recognised as part of the carrying value of the financial liability and amortized over the expected life using the EIR. It also includes expenses related to borrowing which are not part of effective interest as not directly related to loan origination.

H) Retirement and other employee benefits

(a) Defined Contribution Plans:

Contribution as per the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 towards Provident Fund and Pension Fund is not applicable to the company. Hence no provision made for this and other employee benefits.

(b) Defined Benefit Plans:

The company provides for gratuity, a defined benefit retirement plan ('the Gratuity Plan') covering eligible employees. The Gratuity plan provides a lump-sum payment to vested employees at retirement, death, incapacitation or termination of employment, of an amount based on the respective employee's salary and the tenure of employment with the company. No Provision has been made on account of gratuity as tenure required as per governing law is not concluded.

The company has complied with Ind AS 19 'Employee Benefits'. There is no present obligation of any post-employment benefit including gratuity during the year. Therefore, no actuarial gain or loss arose at the end of the year.

(c) Short-term and other long-term employee benefits:

A liability is recognised for benefits accruing to employees in respect of salaries in the period in which related service is rendered.

Liabilities recognised in respect of short-term employee benefits are measured at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the related service.

I) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the

obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

A provision for onerous contracts is recognised when the expected benefits to be derived by the Company from a contract are lower than the unavoidable cost of meeting its obligations under the contract. The provision is measured at the present value of the lower of the expected cost of terminating the contract and the expected net cost of continuing with the contract.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

In case of litigations, provision is recognised once it has been established that the Company has a present obligation based on information available up to the date on which the Company's financial statements are finalised and may in some cases entail seeking expert advice in making the determination on whether there is a present obligation.

Contingent Liabilities

Contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognised because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. Company does not recognise contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

Contingent Assets

Contingent assets are not recognised in the financial statements but are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

J) Commitments

Commitments are future liabilities for contractual expenditure, classified and disclosed as follows:

- a) Estimated amount of contracts remaining to be executed on capital account and not provided for;
- b) Uncalled liability on shares and other investments partly paid;
- c) Funding related commitment to subsidiaries / associate;
- d) Other non-cancellable commitments, if any, to the extent they are considered material and relevant in the opinion of management.
- e) Other commitments related to sales/procurements made in the normal course of business are not disclosed to avoid excessive details.

K) Taxation

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred taxes. Income tax expense is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, other comprehensive income, or directly in equity when they relate to items that are recognized in the respective line items.

Current tax

Current tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior years are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from, or paid to, the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted, or substantively enacted, by the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates taxable income.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except:

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

L) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash, Cash equivalents and bank balances include fixed deposits (with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of placement), margin money deposits, and earmarked balances with banks which are carried at amortised cost. Short term and liquid investments which are not subject to more than insignificant risk of change in value, are included as part of cash and cash equivalents.

M) Statement of Cash Flows

Statement of Cash Flows is prepared segregating the cash flows into operating, investing, and financing activities. Cash flow from operating activities is reported using an indirect method adjusting the net profit for the effects of:

- i. Change during the period in operating receivables and payables transactions of a non-cash nature;
- ii. non-cash items such as depreciation, impairment, deferred taxes, unrealised foreign currency gains and losses, and undistributed profits of associates and joint ventures; and
- iii. All other items for which the cash effects are investing or financing cash flows.

N) Segment Reporting

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Chief Operating Decision-Maker (CODM). The CODM assess the financial performance and position of the Company and makes strategic decisions.

The Company is predominantly engaged in a single reportable segment of 'Investment and Credit Company (ICC) as per Ind AS 108 - Segment Reporting.

O) Earnings per Share ('EPS')

The Company reports basic and diluted earnings per share in accordance with Ind AS 33 on Earnings per share. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares. Dilutive potential equity shares are deemed converted as of the beginning of the period, unless they have been issued at a later date. In computing the dilutive earnings per share, only potential equity shares that are dilutive and that either reduce the earnings per share or increase loss per share are included.

(ii) Retained Earnings

This reserve represents the cumulative profits of the Company. This can be utilised in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

Provision as per ECL is Rs 62,61,820.33/- and as per RBI IRAC Norms is 6,29,89,850.50/- difference of Rs 5,67,28,030.18/- is transferred to Impairment reserve.

These valuation techniques maximise the use of observable market data where it is available and rely as little as possible on the company specific estimated. If all significant inputs required to fair value an instrument are observable, then the instrument is included in level 2.

30. Risk Management

Whilst risk is inherent in the Company's activities, it is managed through an integrated risk management framework including ongoing identification, measurement and monitoring, subject to risk limits and other controls. This process of risk management is critical to the Company's continuing profitability and each individual within the Company is accountable for the risk exposures relating to his or her responsibilities. The Company is mainly exposed to market risk, Operational Risk, liquidity risk and credit risk. It is also subject to various operating and business risks. The Board of Directors are responsible for the overall risk management approach and for approving the risk management strategies and principles.

(a) Market Risk

The Company is exposed to equity price risk arising from its equity instruments held as stock in trade. Equity price risk is related to the change in market reference price of the investment in equity securities. The Company considers factors such as track record, market reputation, fundamental and technical analysis for dealing in such instruments.

Market Risk is the possibility of loss arising from changes in the value of a financial instrument as a result of changes in market variables such as interest rates, exchange rates and other asset prices. The Company's exposure to market risk is a function of asset liability management and interest rate sensitivity assessment. The company is exposed to interest rate risk and liquidity risk, if the same is not managed properly. The company continuously monitors these risks and manages them through appropriate risk limits.

(b) Operational Risk

Operational risk is the risk of loss resulting from inadequate or failed internal processes, people or systems, or from external events. The operational risks of the Company are managed through comprehensive internal control systems and procedures. Failure of managing operational risk might lead to legal / regulatory implications due to non-compliance and lead to financial loss due to control failures. While it is not practical to eliminate all the operational risk, the Company has put in place adequate control framework by way of segregation of duties, well defined process, staff training, maker and checker process, authorisation and clear reporting structure. The effectiveness of control framework is assessed by internal audit on a periodic basis.

(c) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity is the Company's capacity to fund increase in assets and meet both the expected and unexpected obligations without incurring unacceptable losses. Liquidity risk is the inability to meet such obligations as they become due without adversely affecting the company's financial conditions. The Asset Liability Management Policy of the Company stipulates a broad framework for Liquidity risk management to ensure that the Company can meet its liquidity obligations.

The Company maintains a portfolio of highly marketable and diverse assets that are assumed to be easily liquidated in the event of an unforeseen interruption in cash flow. The liquidity position of the company is assessed under a variety of scenarios giving due consideration to stress factors relating to both the market in general and risk specifics to the Company. Basis the liquidity position assessed under various stress scenarios; the Company reviews the following to effectively handle any liquidity crisis:

* Adequacy of contingency funding plan in terms of depth of various funding sources, time to activate, cost of borrowing, etc

* Availability of unencumbered eligible assets.
